

Pastor Dan: 'Our Culture'

When I flew back to Minnesota this past February, I flew on Southwest Airlines. When I took my seat, I did the usual getting settled into my little personal space. A part of this process for me is to check out what is in the pocket on the seat back in front of me. I found an issue of Southwest the Magazine, in it an article written by Chairman and CEO Gary Kelly. The article was entitled: An Appeal for Civility.

In it Kelly writes about the culture of Southwest reflecting that of the Golden Rule, embracing civility and delivering heartfelt hospitality. I thought this was interesting; that this business in the secular district is embracing what I would hope that as a church, congregationally, locally, and nationally we might find at our core as well.

I think religion and church carry a stigma with them, often undeserved, and misinformed, but yet present because of one person's bad experience, shared with another, and another, until the church is seen not as a place of welcome, or a place that strives to reflect God's love in the world, a place that takes the Great Commission from Matthew 28 seriously and seeks to bear God's amazing grace to a world that is often dark and hurting. That is the church at its best, I suppose, a community, a culture that strives to enrich the lives of others through the sharing of the Good News of Jesus Christ.

What I have heard about the church however is often quite different from this ideal, and stand-

ard we try to set for ourselves. What I have heard is a wariness of the church, a fear of what they think the church might represent... a place not of love but of judgment and hate; a place that looks down on someone because they might have made a mistake in their lives. Certainly the sexual abuse scandals that have come out over the past 30 plus years have not done any good in the eyes of those who were already wary of the church as an institution. If we take a good hard look at the church as an institution we can understand where some of the skepticism and anger directed towards the church can come from.

I liked the message I read in Southwest the Magazine...they seem to get that in order to be successful, especially as an airline with the recent issues of passenger mistreatment - I'm referring to instances where people have been physically removed because a

plane was overbooked - if they hope to embrace to live a culture that is hospitable, and civil...and to use a Christian term loving. If an airline can do this, can we take a look at ourselves and hold ourselves to the same standards?

I am writing this during Holy Week. This Sunday we will celebrate our Lord's triumphant victory over death. We celebrate the life that He has given us...life abundant. What does the Easter message mean for us as we engage with a secular culture that can often look at the church with suspicious eyes? The resurrection does not make any sense unless you are a Christian; we cannot assume unchurched people will understand the baseline from which we operate.

I do believe, however, that there are characteristics that transcend both the religious and the secular realms; a place where these two cultures can agree on some things. Those things are hospitality, civility, and the Golden Rule. We love because God has first loved us. He loved us when "we were dead in sin" as our confession liturgy affirms; that is the love which we must bear to the ends of the earth, that is the message that we must proclaim through our words and our deeds, without any expectation for anything in return...that is an Easter love we all have experienced and can hope to reflect in our lives.

Remembering Glenn Frederiksen

Glenn H. Frederiksen ("Freddie"), age 91, from Post Falls, Idaho, passed away on Jan. 31, 2018 at Hospice of North Idaho. Son of Herluf and Anna Frederiksen, Glenn was born on July 21, 1926 in Tyler, Minn. He married the love of his life, Harriet Bille, on Oct. 8, 1950 at Danebod Lutheran Church (also in Tyler, Minn.). Over the 67 years that Glenn and Harriet were married, they lived in Minnesota, South Dakota, Montana and Idaho.

Glenn proudly served in the United States Army from February 1945 to December 1946, and while completing his overseas service, he received several decorations and citations. Glenn was a highly skilled carpenter and had a long and successful career as a building contractor.

Hunting and fishing were Glenn's passion, as well as being a faithful fan of the Seattle Mariners and Minnesota Twins. (His beloved pet dog, Tony, was named after Twins player, Tony Oliva). He was also a member of the American Legion for 72 years.

A Pathway Through High Places: Marion Keating's Journey of Faith

*I will lift my eyes to the hills.
From where does my help come?
My help comes from the LORD,
who made heaven and earth.*
– Psalm 121:1

Psalm 121 is a hymn that has special meaning for Marion Keating. With eyes that are lifted to the hills, we get a sense of perspective – an awareness of God's glory and power and love. For someone who loves the grandeur of Glacier National Park as she does, signs of God's glory are visible everywhere she looks.

The hills where Marion grew up were not nearly as majestic as Glacier. The website of the Caledonia, Minnesota Visitors' Bureau describes the area as a place "... where the land transitions from rolling hills to scenic bluffs and the Mississippi River Valley." Marion was the second of three girls born to John and Lydia Midvy. She grew up on the family farm outside Caledonia, MN.

She was baptized at Stone Church in Houston, MN. As a young girl, Marion divided her time between the farm, the one-room schoolhouse (a two-mile walk from her home), and Immanuel Lutheran Church in Caledonia, where she later attended high school. She recalls having felt more comfortable driving the horses and caring for the other farm animals than in the kitchen.

Following graduation, Marion worked for the Treasurer of the Caledonia Creamery, and then as a telephone operator. In 1955, Marion and her roommate decided it was time to do something interesting. They decided to try Florida, but Marion found it too hot and muggy, and soon returned home. A neighbor suggested she apply with the Great Northern Railroad to work in Glacier Park. She did, and was hired, and it changed her life.

During summers, Marion worked first as a telephone operator, then in reservations, and later in the gift shop warehouse. During winters she would visit family in Portland, or go back to work for Great Northern in St. Paul. She could travel for free on the railroad, and slept in a berth.

She especially enjoyed delivering gift merchandise from the warehouse to the various hotels, meeting the seasonal staff – which were all good people – and going out for hikes after work. Among those she met was the captain of a boat at Two Medicine Lake. His name was Warren "Squirt" Keating, from Coeur d'Alene. She liked that he talked a lot, and that he knew the geology of the park. They were not immediately attracted to each other; she'd see him once in a while when he'd come to East Glacier. When Squirt asked Marion out, she was agreeable, and they continued going out together for a year or so. About that time Great Northern sold the Glacier concessions to Don Hummel's Company. Marion was hired to transport the records from Glacier to Hummel's home office in Tucson, AZ. She continued to work there, helping to organize the operation. In the midst of this transition, Squirt appeared. With a proposal. For marriage.

Marion and Squirt were married April 18, 1962, in Sandpoint, as Squirt didn't want a big wedding, and Marion had only arrived from Tucson a week or so earlier. As

soon as Squirt's classes were over at NIC, they traveled to Minnesota to introduce him to Marion's parents, and then to Glacier, to help open the park for the summer.

The flood of '63 damaged roads and bridges at the park, preventing much of it from opening. As a result, Marion and Squirt settled year-round in Coeur d'Alene, Squirt teaching at NIC and Marion working with the State Forestry. They soon became members of Trinity Lutheran Church. In the Fall of '65, the Secretary at Trinity quit, and Marion was hired to replace her. She estimates that she worked for 20 pastors, including associate pastors, intern pastors, and interims. Her office moved around as the church facility was expanded. Sometimes she made do with little more than a closet for an office. Weekends she and Squirt would spend time in the cabin he built near Chicken Point on Hayden Lake in '56, and making the occasional trip back to the mountains and lakes of Glacier Park.

Her work at the church required the careful keeping of records, some of which were in Norwegian. Over the years, Marion developed a strong sense of family with the families of this congregation. She enjoyed helping with weddings, baptisms, funerals, receptions, and continues to find ways of supporting the ministry of the church; serving as "Sanctuary Angel", giving guidance to Lutheran Auxiliary, Circle, and TLCW, and helping secure the church facility during Kids Club. After Squirt's death May 9, 2010, she considered returning to Minnesota where she still has family, but felt closer to the family she has made here in North Idaho, where she has watched two godchildren grow. This writer and his wife are among the many who have found in Marion's warm reception a wonderful sense of homecoming.

One path of Marion's faith journey was formed in the beauty and

majesty of the mountains and valleys of Glacier National Park, and the other led through the close ties of her Trinity family. She continues to witness to her strong and deep faith in Christ and to bless those around her. The following are comments from a few of Marion's friends.

Marion and Squirt graciously agreed to be Ryanne's godparents and Marion has kept watch over Ryanne ever since. She spreads her kindness to others--always taking care of those around her. 
Council Catch Up

Among the positions to be filled are: one Lutherhaven Delegate and two people for the 2019 Synod Assembly Delegation.




